Capt. Percy Herbert Cherry, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company in the attack with great gallantry and captured the enemy's position together with two machine guns. Later, although wounded, he continued to command his men.

Lt. Edmund Cornish, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led an attacking party with great gallantry and captured an enemy strong point, together with 29 prisoners. Later, although severely wounded, he continued to command his men.

Lt. Eden Lloyd Davies, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in charge of a bombing party. He bombed along the trench for a distance of over 200 yards and held his position against several strong enemy counter-attacks.

Lt. William Lawrence Davies, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took charge of a company, and by his fine example enabled a successful attack to be launched. He continued to command throughout the day, and was largely responsible for the capture of 600 yards of the enemy's trench.

Lt. Raymond Scott Evatt, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his men forward under very heavy fire in a most gallant manner and succeeded in capturing his objective. He has previously done fine work.

Lt. Leon Dudley Ferguson, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his men in the attack with great gallantry and captured 120 yards of the enemy's trench, together with 30 prisoners. He has at all times set a fine example of courage and determination.

Lt. Frank Sutherland Hall, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised his men under very heavy fire and gallantly led them forward to their objective. Later, he ably organised the defence of the captured position.

Capt. John Hardie, Army Med. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He attended a large number of wounded at the aid post under heavy fire and continued at work after being wounded himself in two places. He set a fine example throughout.

Lt. William Emlyn Hardwick, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When his platoon was held up by fire from a mine crater he rushed forward with three men, killing two of the enemy and dispersing the remainder. He set a fine example of courage and initiative.

Lt. John Percy Hill, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a patrol in a most gallant manner and succeeded in driving back a

strong party of the enemy. On another occasion, although himself wounded and greatly outnumbered by the enemy he succeeded in withdrawing his party at a critical time.

Capt. Sydney Robert Houghton, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company in the attack with great gallantry and personally carried out daring reconnaissances under very heavy fire. He has at all times set a splendid example of courage and determination.

Capt. Allan Murray Jones, F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when carrying out a raid on a hostile aerodrome. He descended to a height of 200 feet under very heavy fire and destroyed two hangars. On another occasion he flew for a total of 9 hours and 20 minutes in search of two officers who were lost.

Capt. Alfred Raywold Knightley, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of two companies. He showed great initiative in reorganising his men under heavy fire after each objective was gained. He set a splendid example throughout the operations.

2nd Lt. William Alfred Leaver, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised a bombing attack at a critical time, and succeeded in gaining a lot of the enemy's trench. He set a fine example to his men. He was subsequently wounded.

Lt. Francis Claude Lloyd, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and initiative in clearing the enemy trenches in the face of fierce and determined opposition. He sent in most valuable reports throughout the operations.

Lt. Robert Andrew Malcolm Murray, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his party in the attack with great courage and determination, and by his fine example inspired his men at a critical time. He previously carried out several dangerous reconnaissances, and obtained most valuable information.

Capt. William Robert Clement Robertson, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his men in the attack with great gallantry, and succeeded in capturing his objective. Later, although wounded, he remained with his men throughout the night.

Capt. Clarence Rumball, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He made several reconnaissances of unknown ground under heavy fire, and by his quick appreciation of the situation and prompt action greatly assisted in the success of the operations.

2nd Lt. Charles Douglas Scott, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out several daring reconnaissances under heavy fire, and obtained
